#### Reds 6th Annual Reunion: "Best ever!"

Folks who attended the 6th Annual Reunion at Goddard State Park in Warwick ran out of superlatives to describe the weekend event that celebrated the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the R. I. Reds last AHL Calder Cup championship of 1955-56.

"This was the best ever," said Ray Ross, a pivotal forward on that title team. Ray had attended all five previous reunions sponsored by the R. I. Reds Heritage Society and summed up the 6th saying, "What a weekend to remember. My family and I will never forget it!"

Bob Robertson, a defenseman who was an important component of the Reds '55-56 triumph, also made his sixth visit to the annual event. "These reunions get bigger and better each year," he enthused. "I cannot imagine what the Society can do next year to improve. This year was absolutely perfect!"

The two referenced what turned out to be a three-day gala (August 3-5) that unfolded with the following itinerary:

Friday, August 3: Out-of-state players checked into the brand new, sparkling Hilton Garden Inn located near the airport in Warwick. For the next three days they enjoyed being complimentary guests of Society's "Host a Hockey Hero" program, sponsored by generous contributions from local corporations and individuals.

Weary from travel, the players and their families nevertheless attended a low-key, informal reception at the hotel that evening. Players willingly obliged in autographing copies of an original poster created specifically to commemorate the 1955-56 Calder Cup championship team.


Saturday, August 4: Throughout Saturday, many of the players and their families spent time site-seeing and/or shopping. Late in the afternoon, around 5:30 p.m., the "Hotelers" assembled and boarded a chartered bus that would take them to a private VIP reception at the elegant home of Jim and J. J. Not only did the hotel guests attend, but also many former Reds who are now residents of Rhode Island and nearby Massachusetts and Connecticut were on hand along with special local "friends of hockey." Jim and J. J. did themselves proud by providing deliciously catered New England-fare food, spirited liquid cheer and, of course, their own down-home, good-will hospitality. It truly was "Hockey Night in Rhode Island," compliments of J. J. and Jim, who is youngest of five sons of the late Harvey Bennett.

**Sunday, August 5:** And so came the big day. In the morning, soon after the night's previous party surprise, the "Hotelers" were greeted by complimentary copies of the *Providence Journal*, the state's largest newspaper. As they read, they were astonished. The sport section's front page and two additional inside pages chronicled the glorious 51-year history of the Reds and recapped the heroics of the 1955-56 title season.

Many who rose early and ate breakfast at the Hilton Garden Inn carefully read the *Journal* and prepared for the big reunion day. Thanks to an evening-before donation of transportation by Bill Gilbane, president of Gilbane Building Company in Providence, the "Hotelers" boarded yet another comfort bus at 11:30 a.m. and headed for the Society's traditional reunion site, the historic carousel building at Goddard State Park in Warwick. Shortly after their noon arrival, the players and their families were greeted by over 270 admirers, both old time and brand new Reds fans.

To the inspiring organ music of "Roll out the Barrel" (theme song of the Reds at the old R. I. Auditorium), 28 ex-Reds in all marched onto the stage to the deafening applause of their loyal fans, past and present.

Seven players from that '55-56 cup team and eight family members representing the deceased champions were presented with commemorative plaques. The Tops award for 2006/07 and three special service awards were also given out. Telling a better story, photos for each of the three-day event follow.













#### Stan Baluik Presented with "Tops Award" for 2006-07





Stan Baluik, a standout center with the old Rhode Island Reds, received the Rhode Island Reds Heritage Society's "Tops Award" for 2006-07 at the organization's sixth annual reunion at Goddard State Park in Warwick on August 6.

The society presents the award annually to honor Zellio Toppazzini, Reds' "Player of the Century," and the team's all-time leading scorer. Recipients are selected by

the society based on outstanding contributions to the Rhode Island Reds hockey club and public service as a citizen within the broader community.

Baluik served the Reds for five seasons, starting in 1959-60 when he was named the American Hockey League's "Rookie of the Year." For three seasons he also centered the team's famous prolific "B-line" and consistently set up plays for his high scoring wingers, Jimmy Bartlett and Pierre Brilliant.

With the Reds he played 359 regular season and playoff games, scored 130 goals and added 257 assists for 387 points, an average of 1.08 points per game. His career numbers with the Reds place him ninth in goals scored, fifth in assists and sixth in total points.

Clearly one of the Reds' top players at that time, Baluik surprised the club and took another path in the fall of 1964. As a youngster in Canada, he had fallen in love with the game of golf. He had competed in the Canadian Open at age 15 and turned professional at 19.

So, at age of only 29 and earning only about \$6,000 a year in hockey, Baluik accepted an offer to become head golf professional at the brand new Kirkbrae Country Club in Lincoln. He stayed there 42 years before his retirement in 2005. Through that period his personal accomplishments as a golfer have been numerous, including championship finishes in both the Rhode Island and Vermont Open tournaments

More importantly, though, his work off the course has been an inspiration to young golfers throughout New England. Nearly a dozen of his assistants are now working as head golf pros, carrying forth his credo of work ethic and love of the game. He has also nurtured hundreds of young high school and college golfers.

"The selection of Stan Baluik as this year's 'Tops Award' winner is a hole-in-one for everybody," said Buster Clegg, president of the R. I. Reds Heritage Society. "I've known Stan since 1959 and he <u>is</u> the real thing. He embraces every standard we have set as a worthy recipient of this honor."

Joe Sprague, Jr., executive director of the R. I. Golf Association, also praised the selection of Stan for this year's "Tops" award. "Stan was a good friend of my father, and I had the distinct honor to induct him into the Rhode Island Golf Hall of Fame last summer during the 100th RI State Amateur.

"It's not often in life that a person is able to have such a big impact in two completely different sports arenas in a community. Stan Baluik has done that, which is a tremendous accomplishment."

Stan and his wife Marge live in Cumberland and are parents of three grown children. Like their dad, all three are involved in golf.

#### Heritage Society Works with AHL "Hall of Fame" Committee

The American Hockey League recently invited the R.I. Reds Heritage Society to participate in suggesting nominations for the league's "Hall of Fame Class of 2007." The Society's recommendations were submitted in advance of the AHL's selection committee's mid-September meeting at which the league was to vote on all nominations, including those from our organization.

The AHL is expected to announce its selections sometime in the new few weeks. Being invited to participate in nomination suggestions is a distinct honor for our Society and we eagerly await the release of selections voted by the AHL.
